My dear friends

Our editor Elma Milne is breathing down my neck to make sure I get this letter for the magazine written before I head off to China on my holiday in a few days time – Elma can be really bossy you know!

I am awaiting news from our architect, our finance people and our project coordinator Angus Spence over the next two days and hope to have much more information from them before I head off to China. This is because at a recent meeting of the Kirk Session a new revised figure of expenditure, budget and fundraising for the renovation was given and it looks as though there is going to be quite a shortfall in our money. A number of suggestions were put forward about altering the plans, the specification, borrowing money and a few more ideas but the one that caught my attention I am going to explain to you.

The Kirk Session may or may not go with this idea but as your minister I want to put this challenge out to you. Talking about money, offerings and donations in the church is always seen as a taboo subject and I can understand why because it is not all about what you can give in monetary terms but I hope and pray that you give what you can afford.

When you become a member of the church you take a promise to give your time, talents and money for the upkeep of the church, God's mission and spreading the Good News of Christ. Billy and I pay our offerings by standing order every month and we also pay our building pledge money every month and with every pound we pay the church also claims gift aid on it – in total Billy and I pay into the church over £200 every month. Now I know that I am working and earning money but Billy and I also have the upkeep of the manse and our own house in Houston however, being part of a church and helping in God's work has always been important to us and when money is tight we still find the means to pay our church giving's. God sacrificed his only son for us, that is real sacrificial giving so I need you to really think about how much you are giving the church whether it be weekly or monthly or yearly. When was the last time you raised your weekly/monthly giving's? I personally increase my giving's every 15 months or so.

I need you also to think about our buildings and the work that is being done in them to bring them into the 21st Century to further God's mission not only for the members of East and Old but also for the community of Forfar and further afield.

To that end I am looking to see if we can find a minimum of 100 people who would willingly give £1000 donation to our renovation project or 200 people willing to give £500 so that we do not need to borrow a large sum of money to pay for the renovations. Is that you? Can you make a sacrificial giving to further Christ's work? Billy and I are not savers money is for spending in this life because as we all know you cannot take it with you – so to that end Billy and I

would like to start the challenge off by donating £1000 each to the renovation plan and believe me my friends that is a lot of money to Billy and I.

I ask you to think about this carefully but most of all pray about it and if you feel you would like to help even more than you are doing now in God's mission and God's work here in East and Old and in Forfar I look forward to hearing you. I will be more than happy to come and collect your money personally and say thank you very much!

I have heard a few comments about people being older and not receiving or getting much benefit from the new buildings but my dear friends that is always the way of the church and has been since the church began. We need to look to the future and the future generations who will use our buildings as did the members of East and Old for last 225 years. There is a well-known statistic in the church circles; 10% of people in a church are the visionaries and then there are 10% of people who will catch on and support these visionaries. After a while and the momentum starts another 35% start to see and understand what is happening and join in and then after a year or so the next 35% see the vision and start contributing and helping in a bigger way and the last 10% - they just don't like change and will not come around.

To help our members and friends understand what is happening during the renovation period the Kirk Session appointed Angus Spence as our Project Coordinator and he will be giving updates through the Steeple Times and also on our Web Page.

The Kirk Session of East and Old Parish Church need your support and help at this time.

As many of you know Barbara Ann was asked to organise and attend a conference in Malawi during the first two weeks in April with her colleague Carol Finlay who works at 121 as the Local Development Secretary of World Mission.

The preparation beforehand included lots of injections and tablets from the travel clinic and lots of shopping especially for long skirts and long dresses because as a minister Barbara Ann would have lost a great deal of respect had she worn skirts and dresses at or above her knees or had worn trousers! Barbara Ann said she could wax lyrical about the trip and the events but there is not enough room in the Steeple Times.



We have been given the scoop that our minister wants to conduct the SAM during morning worship next year – so watch out for something different yet again.

JOSEPH AND HIS AMAZING TECHNICOLOUR DREAMCOAT EVENING in the

church – what a good night and lots of challenges – especially singing the songs in the right key! Some of the quizzes were easy while other were far more difficult. On screen there were images of the new walls which helped to settle many people in what was planned. A number of questions of course could not be fully answered because we are still awaiting more details but the questions will be answered once we have the answers to them.

The main point being we hope the church sanctuary will reopen mid to late November.

We are short of funds and that will have an impact on what we can do but we are speaking to the architect regarding this. The Kirk Session will be meeting on Barbara Ann's return to discuss the plans and finance in greater detail. You will also see a report in this issue from Angus Spence our project co-ordinator.

COMMUNION SUNDAY was relatively well attended at the end of April but it could have been much better. The numbers were down by approximately 30 people and have been dropping like this over the last two years or so. Our minister and the elders are wondering why? Is the fourth Sunday in April and October no longer suitable? Is it the time of the evening service? Have members forgotten their commitment to attend communion services? WORKERS

The Polish workers arrived on Monday 9th May to start dismantling the organ. Within a few hours all the decoration pipes at the front of the organ were dismantled and packaged. By the Wednesday when the first lorry arrived all the pipes both external and internal and the console were packed onto the lorry and sent to Poland. On the lorry were over 2,500 pieces from the organ. The work then began on the bellows and the real heavy parts of the organ.

These men worked from 7am to 7pm every day and at the end of every day until our minister went on her holidays were up at the manse getting showered. Thank you everyone for opening up their houses for showers after that.

Thank you also to the members who handed in food to help out the builders food supply and give them something different to eat. Thank you also to the people who donated sleeping bags and we hope you got the right ones back!

That then brings us to our workers! They must be exhausted! A number of people stayed behind after morning worship on the 8th May to start clearing away a lot of items and moving a lot of other items down to the church hall – this included men and women! Carpets were lifted, temporary walls erected, and on and on the list went – they finished at 5.30pm – thank you all so very much for your hard work.

During the first week as the Polish workers worked on the organ our men worked on removing

radiators, taking down the plasma screens and building a room under the west balcony to store the chairs, the new organ, speakers, plasma screens and a whole lot more.

fter the Polish workers left our men went back in to dismantle the four stations and take out the last 4 pews that were remaining downstairs. This all sounds quite simple as it is written but our members have been working extremely hard and have saved us a fortune. Bill Duthie even roped in his son and grandson to help on the 8th May because he wasn't available.

The Council announced that almost 11,000 people from all over Scotland have responded to their request for views which will guide the Council's work for the next decade and beyond as they seek to move to a deliberately more pro-active and community based approach to their work. The Council also say that the campaign asked people to identify the core issues which would enable Scotland and the world to become fairer, more equal and more just.

World Mission have informed me that 2015 used stamps raised £3511 for the Church of Scotland HIV Programme.

From March 2016 the money raised is going to Eco-spirituality Centre run by the Church of South India. Innovations supported include re-use of rain water, a bio-gas plant to power the kitchens and the development of a small dairy and chicken farm for native breeds. The Centre hope to pass this on to their communities because "caring for the earth is not a calling, but a lifestyle". Another 2kg of stamps have just been sent to Wishaw.
