#### Hello my dear friends

## WHAT'S BEEN HAPPENING

**Guided Tour of Priory** – this event was organised by our outreach team and Heather Munro who is the convener of the Green Team and works at the archives at Restenneth Priory. Those who attended both the morning and afternoon tours found the tour very interesting and would recommend it if the tour was run again.



**Fairtrade Coffee** Morning – a good morning all round with lots of home baking sold FAIRTRADE and a good number of items sold from the

Fairtrade stall. Our event clashed with two other events in Forfar and the Angus Show so the numbers were lower than normal. Thank you to all who helped at this event and raised the awareness of Fairtrade and also £360.

Farmington Football Club – Susan Forbes one our elders in East and Old is the chaplain for Farmington Football Club Barbara Ann and Susan welcomed members of the club; players, coaching staff, admin staff and chairperson to a thanksgiving service for the club. Football skills were demonstrated by some of the team members and as the football was being kicked and headed it was well controlled and nowhere near the stained glass windows! The whole service revolved around being a team just like Jesus had his team and East

and Old has their team.

**Rev Johanna Gabarone from South** Africa – at the end of the General Assembly Barbara Ann is normally asked to host a foreign visitor and East and Old were delighted to welcome the Rev Johanna. Many of our members welcomed and spoke to Johanna and she spoke at the service about who she was, the area she lives in, the church she is involved in and a few differences in custom and culture but most of all we are all God's children

Kirk Session Meeting – this turned out to be one of the longest meetings that the Kirk Session has had since Barbara Ann arrived in Forfar. The Kirk Session were informed that East and Old do not bring in enough money to cover their monthly outgoings and at the moment there is a £2000 shortfall each month and that this must be looked at with some urgency. It was agreed that we hold a Back to Church Month in October and a small committee was to be organised to look at this. However it was good to have the discussions and hear different points of view and to discuss the merits of new ventures that the Kirk Session want to undertake this coming year. Under discussion was also Phase 2 of the church renovation programme and we hope to have more information available for you in the next edition of

the newsletter. We are still having problems with the sound system and the loop system and the Kirk Session want this resolved ASAP. Watch out later in this edition for the new ventures that East and Old are starting in the month of August and the children's holiday club at the end of July/beginning August.

**Church Hired Out** – Forfar Academy once again hired the whole church for two days to work with their 5<sup>th</sup> Year pupils that are moving into 6<sup>th</sup> Year. The school under the leadership of Mr Martin were very pleased with the new look church and the flexible space it offered.

**Presbytery Communion** – the last act of the outgoing Moderator of the Presbytery is to hold a Presbytery Communion Service in their own church. Therefore East and Old was to host the Presbytery Communion at the beginning of June led by our own minister. A good number of members from Presbytery turned out as did members of East and Old and a few members of others churches. Once again Barbara Ann brought a different style and approach to communion which was well received. Barbara Ann would like to thank all those members. of East and Old who turned out and to the elders for serving communion so well. A thank you to Lexi Smart, Jean Alexander and Bob Kidd for arranging bread and wine and to Irene and her team for the tea/coffee and goodies and to Bill for setting up the church

and social area. We think we are going to rename Margaret Robertson's shorties as E&O Shorties because they are appearing all the time – thank you Margaret!

**FACT** – the FACT AGM took place at the beginning of June with Rev Karen Fenwick finishing her term as Chairperson and Major Jim McCluskey taking this role over with Rev Maggie Hunt taking on vice-chair. A cheque was presented to SEEMA's House the charity FACT chose for 2016/2017 and then a presentation was given by Margaret Benson from the Inspiration Orchestra the charity that FACT are supporting for 2017/2018 which is a charity designed to bring music and instruments into people's lives who are severely disabled.

**Elders Thanksgiving Service** – at a Kirk Session meeting earlier in the year it was decided that as a church we would not present long service awards but instead offer a thanksgiving service for the work and dedication of the elders serving today and former elders who are still members of the church also. There was a good turnout from our serving elders with a number of former serving elders attending and glad to be there also. Our minister then thanked all elders past and present and also the congregation for the work they do in Christ's name also.

**Presbytery Five Yearly Church** 

**Review** – this took place in the middle of June to which we had hoped a good number of people would have

attended but Barbara Ann would like to thank the 20 people who did show up out of a membership of nearly 800! We were congratulated on many aspects of our work within the Church of Scotland and the variety of mission work that we undertake. Our group brought to the forefront some of the challenges that we face in the coming months and years: how to get our under 60 age group members to become more involved in church life and also for more people to take on responsibilities within the church and money for phase two of our redevelopment. It was pointed out to our members that the culture we are living it at the moment has changed dramatically and the under 40's do not want to belong to organisations or clubs and that is being show in their children also. The report from Presbytery was very favourable indeed.

**Inspiration Orchestra** – this is FACT's chosen charity for 2017/2018 and a concert was given at Lowson Church towards the end of June. The severely disabled members of the orchestra really come alive when they are playing their instruments with some of them only being able to place their fingers on one note. This orchestra are not only an inspiration to the members and their families but also to all those people who watch the concerts.

**Groovy Gryphon's** – as you will be aware our minister encourages our youngsters to share their news with us every Sunday and it is a delight to hear what has been happening in their lives even though sometimes we are not too sure about the modern films and toys etc. Stephanie allowed us to read her story that is going to published in a children's story book from children all over Scotland and she only had a set amount of words to use. Stephanie has given us permission to use the story in the Steeple Times.

#### **Twinning News**

After a relatively quiet time for the Twinning committee, preparations are in full swing for a number of events in 2018 and beyond.

Firstly, from 15<sup>th</sup> March next year, we are to host the choir of our twin, Zuglo church in Budapest, Hungary who will be visiting us and performing 3 concerts in the area, including our church. This is part of the partnership agreement to learn from each other and cooperate. Zuglo church has a very large and active church choir and we hope this will provide a focus for their visit to East & Old. They will of course be taking part in some other church activities and sightseeing in the area. We shall be looking for volunteers who can host one or more of the visitors in their homes during the 5 day visit. More details to follow but please let Barbara Ann or Karen Liddle know if you are interested in hosting.

Secondly, we have the Zwingli Anniversary Partnership Project which is a new venture for East & Old. On 12<sup>th</sup> July, Barbara Ann and Karen flew out to Zurich, Switzerland to take part in a steering group planning session. This initial visit was to organise a visit to Switzerland for churches from four countries to celebrate the reformer Huldrych Zwingli's 500<sup>th</sup> anniversary in 2018. This involved East & Old church, representing Scotland as well as 2 churches from the Zurich area, Switzerland, our twin partners from Zuglo, Hungary and a church in Bavaria, Germany. Following our lengthy discussions we decided to hold the event from 11<sup>th</sup>-16<sup>th</sup> July 2018 subject to flight times, with a joint Scottish and Hungarian visit to Switzerland focussing on Reformation history and the Zwingli commemoration. This would be a wonderful opportunity for a four-way cooperation between our churches.

As the Swiss were keen to meet the rest of our congregation and see our church also, a "meet and greet" visit to Scotland was proposed for the Swiss congregations, and the dates for that are to be 9<sup>th</sup>-14<sup>th</sup> May, subject to flights. #### More from Barbara Ann & Karen's trip to Zurich!

As mentioned in the twinning news, Barbara Ann and Karen set off for Zurich on 12<sup>th</sup> July on a fact-finding mission to plan a Reformation partnership project with churches from 4 countries to commemorate Zwingli next year. It was a great opportunity to meet with the Swiss ministers and members and learn more about the way they work, as well as reunite with our friends from Zuglo church, Noemi and Zoltan. Lots of discussions were had, both formally and informally on church life, faith and similarities and differences between our respective churches. It was a great learning experience for us both.

Due to flight times Barbara Ann and I arrived on the Wednesday evening and enjoyed our evening meal with our hosts. We were given a great tour of Zurich on the Thursday, including the church where Zwingli preached in Zurich, the house where he lived and translated the Bible and many other local sights. A pleasant evening was had getting to know Catherine, the Swiss minister organising the project. The Hungarians joined us on the Friday and the planning meetings took place. Everyone involved in this project was keen to take it forward and could see many possibilities to deepen our faith and understand cultural differences but certainly to learn from each other.

On Saturday we visited Zwingli's birth place and museum and took a trip up the mountain nearby to see God's wonderful creation in all its glory. Switzerland certainly has some stunning landscapes and our walking group would love it!

Dübendorf Church had budgeted for this visit and both we and the Hungarians did not spend any money while we were there. The hosts that we stayed with were lovely, warm and very welcoming.

The church service on Sunday was wonderful. Worship was led by Catherine and the service started with a bagpiper parading down the aisle playing Highland Cathedral and then the organ joined in. Everyone was welcomed and then Barbara Ann presented a PowerPoint and information about East & Old and then the bag piper played Flower of Scotland. The Hungarians presented their information on Zuglo church and a local man played Hungarian music.

The sermon was in German but both Barbara Ann and I picked up a bit since we could both speak a small amount of German and Catherine had told us previously what it was about. We sang two hymns in English and two in German and everyone said the Lord's Prayer in their own language. At the end of the service we celebrated communion together with Barbara Ann, Zoltan, Noemi and I serving the bread and Catherine, Jurg and two other members of the church serving the wine. Everyone left their seats to form a large ring around the sanctuary for the communion. It did feel a bit strange lifting the cubes of bread into the member's hands and not just offering it to them! Our Hungarian friends left late on Sunday and for Barbara Ann and I Monday morning was another sightseeing trip which took us to Pfannenstiel, Egg where on the viewing platform we saw the Black Forrest on one side and the Eiger summit on the other! We finished our day at Lake Zurich before heading to the airport. A great trip with some fantastic new connections made and a new opportunity for us all to learn from each other as well as the chance to see some truly wonderful scenery and culture.
