There will be the daily papers for you to sit and read, puzzle books, cards, dominoes, toys and games for children too – everyone is welcome at both venues and you don't need to be a member of the church – we welcome all people. Starting Monday 14th November every weekday Monday to Friday and East and Old will be open from 9:30am to 12:30pm and Lowson Memorial 12:30pm to 3:30pm. If you want company and a chat we can supply that too. No cost is involved for those coming along. If people do come along, we hope to run this until sometime in April. We are looking for volunteers who could cover this one morning every two weeks and would only involve filling a flask of hot water and washing the mugs at the end of the morning – everything else will be laid out. Can you spare one morning for 3 hours once a fortnight?

nother word from the minister - My dear friends, after reading the articles before this you will see that we are in desperate need for more volunteers and helpers in many aspects of our church life. I personally have some concerns in what is happening in our church and if our volunteer pool does not go up then some of these needed activities and events will simply stop. Now that may not be a concern to you but with all the changes happening with the Forfar and surrounding churches it should concern you. None of the volunteering roles in the church are that onerous and are relatively easy to do, so I am asking you two things at this point. CLEARLY THERE IS GOING TO BE SOME DIFFICULT FINANCIAL TIMES AHEAD. THE FOLOWING IS A LIST OF POSSIBLE ENERGY SAVING TIPS.

- You can monitor your use of energy with a SMART METER
- HEATING only use as and when required don't leave on all day
- HEATING WATER morning and evening may be long enough, but certainly not on all day
- LIGHTING change over to LED bulbs
- ELECTRICAL GOODS avoid leaving on standby i.e. lamps, tv's etc
- WASHING MACHINE use only with full loads. Wash lightly soiled clothes at 30°C
- DISHWASHER only use with a full load, or better still handwash dishes in a basin
- DOMESTIC APPLIANCES look for and use Economy cycles and use at the cheaper rate of power
- ▼ TUMBLE DRIER AVOID THE USE OF, use a clotheshorse or dry outside if possible - DO NOT DRY CLOTHES ON A RADIATOR
- KETTLES only boil enough water as is required i.e. two cups of tea to the minimum level
- IRONING do at a lower setting
- OVENS use only when absolutely necessary
- CHARGING ITEMS charging phones, hearing aids, I-pads etc, always unplug when finished
- FOOD defrost frozen food in the fridge it helps to keep the temperature of the fridge lower, thus using less power.
- ENERGY BILLS if possible, pay by Direct Debit you generally get a better rate
- INSULATION grants may be available for loft insulation this could be a big saving
- RADIATORS turn down in rooms that are not always used i.e. hallway or bedrooms and keep doors closed
- PHYGIENE use a shower as opposed to a bath




