LETTER FROM THE MANSE

Happy New Year everyone!

I am writing this letter in the middle of January and the New Year seems so long ago already! However I pray that you have a happy, blessed and peaceful 2020.

On Sunday 12th January my sermon was based on Matthew 3:13-17 which is the passage about Jesus baptism but my sermon was based on the last verse: 'And a voice from heaven said, "This is my Son, whom I love; with him I am well pleased."' The title I gave my sermon was 'When do you feel God's pleasure?' When I was planning and researching for the sermon this really hit home to me. When do I feel **GOD'S** pleasure? When you put the emphasis on different parts of the questions it really can change how you look at the question and how you would answer it.

Interacting and loving people who think and act differently from me; when I try to forgive a hurt that has come my way or to those I love and succeed in doing it; being there for other people and accepting help when it has been offered to me. **WHEN** do I feel God's pleasure – when I speak and preach the word of God and someone says – I understand that! I never thought of it like that! I get it! When I visited someone at home who was poorly and their wife was feeling pressured with all the running around and I just started doing the dishes – washing and drying them. Nothing big or major, just a helping hand! When **DOI** feel God's pleasure? That is easy to answer – when I am with the members and friends of East and Old in any aspect of God's ministry and when I see God's mission being put into practice each and every day by you! I feel blessed to be the minister of East and Old Parish Church and I thank God and also you.

However I would like to ask you the same question that I asked myself. When do you feel **GOD'S** pleasure? **WHEN** do you feel God's pleasure? When **DO YOU** feel God's pleasure? Are you finding this an easy or a difficult task? When is it that you do something that makes God smile? What are those special moments in life that are so sacred and so powerful that you can feel the tingle of God's joyous presence and affirmation?

I pray that you feel this often and if not do what I preach about most Sunday's – become more Christ-like!

Mouse appeared to talk and interact with the children and adults. In the social area there was free food to enjoy from sandwiches, sausage rolls, crisps, fruit, cheese and lots of different



drinks. The highlight for the children was the sweet trolley. Doug Robertson made the large trolley and we filled it with an array of sweets and treats. Thank you to all involved in this big and successful event.

The story and clothes were all brought into the 21st Century and both children and adults were involved in the play. The highlight was when Mary and Joseph arrived in Bethlehem in an Uber (taxi), which consisted of a motorised scooter made into a car and driven by a chauffeur. Our minister uploaded this clip onto the church face book page and it received over 6000 views! It was even liked by 'The Still Game Fan Club'. Thank you to Matthew Scott for organising this whole play.



Christingle Making - this turned out to be difficult for the first time for a number of reasons. Our minister orders the



oranges from Asda every year by click and collect but this year it would not allow the quantities we buy – 350. So she went into the store three weeks before and ordered them directly with the supervisor of fresh produce. On the morning of the 23rd Barbara Ann and Billy went in at 9:00am to collect them only to be given satsumas which were far too small. They were told they did not have enough oranges in store and that they only get a set amount at Christmas. Barbara Ann was not happy! They emptied Asda of all the oranges they had on the shelves and then went to Tesco and managed to get the rest. On arriving at the church slightly later than desired they discovered only 7 people had turned out to help make the Christingles instead of the normal 15 to 20. Everyone worked really quickly but near the end had to move rooms due to a funeral in the church that morning. A big thanks to those who came along to help and to those who stayed longer to get the job done.







C hristingle Service - all singing, all dancing for over 300 people at this service. Our beloved Twelve Days of Christmas was once again sung with gusto and energy and the story of the Jesus birth was put across in numerous ways. 2020 Vision

Our Kirk Session and teams in the church over the next couple of months will be looking at the vision for our church over the next 5 to 7 years. As a church we need to constantly fundraise to cover our daily costs because what we bring in financially through standing orders, envelopes and open plate does not cover our expenses and we annually have a shortfall which runs into thousands of pounds and not just four or five thousand pounds. However we are aware that many people are getting tired of organising fundraising events and for some of those attending them also. To this end we will be looking to run three events this coming year which we hope everyone will support (not including Friends events). Our minister is slightly concerned about this because it means we will see less of some of our members and friends throughout the year as they will attend fundraising events but do not attend bible study, faith discussion or prayer events. Barbara Ann hopes and prays that the fellowship of the church will not falter.



readers. Her second role is the Administrator of the Flower Teamthis involves her organising the Flower Rota and being responsible for receiving and allocating the flower monies.


