Vacancy Update - In the previous Inspire I summarised the progress in our search for a new minister. It might seem like not much has happened, however, a lot has been going on behind the scenes and much progress made. The elected nominating committee members met in October to appoint office bearers.

What's been happening since:

- November 2024: Sale of former East & Old manse at Lour Road was completed.
- December 2024: Acquisition of new East, Old & Inverarity manse at Turfbeg Road. Following this, with all the Church of Scotland criteria met, Perth Presbytery gave us permission to start preparing to call a minister.
- December 2024 -January 2025: Final preparations made to the Parish Profile (a brochure-like document shared with prospective ministers to give a background to the charge with information about the church, the community, the congregation and the work we do). Video recordings were made, photographs taken, and a dedicated vacancy web page prepared.
- January 2025: Susan Forbes stepped down from vacancy committee. The committee met to plan the call process and agree wording. Parish Profile formatted and edited.
- February 2025: Draft Parish Profile sent to Vacancy Advisory Committee, a team of 3 Perth Presbytery members, who check that the content is in obeyance of church law and appropriate. This committee approved our Parish Profile, then it was sent to all Kirk Session members for final edits and approval. All relevant edits made as per requests and final draft approved for publishing on vacancy webpage. Videos and additional information for vacancy page edited. Call for a minister now sent to Church of Scotland for listing on their vacancy page.

From now on, the vacancy committee's work will remain confidential during the recruitment process. It is extremely important that potential candidates have privacy, especially as their own parish may not know their intention to move on, and not to jeopardise a candidate's chances. It is important, therefore, that all information is dealt with in the strictest confidence, and the nomination committee will not be at liberty to disclose any details on the recruitment process until there is a sole nominee. This may take some time. Please, in the interim, do not ask any of the nominating committee members how things are going, if anyone has applied, if there are many applicants, where they come from etc. You will simply be told that we cannot answer that. We hope you all understand, and we will share any news with you when it is permissible to do so. Please be patient as we take the next steps.

Our book for December was 'Being Emily' by Anne Donovan. We discussed it at our meal in January at the Corner House restaurant. It was written in the Glasgow vernacular which wasn't easy to follow sometimes. It

tells of a young Catholic girl Fiona who finds life in their tenement far less interesting than Emily Bronte's. She is forced to look after her family after their mother dies. Her father cannot cope and sets fire to their flat. The family are farmed out to relatives. Fiona is a talented artist at college. She meets an Asian Muslim Jaz but eventually falls in love with his brother, who is very self-centred regarding his sitar music. She has a miscarriage, and her lover is indifferent to her plight. She goes to London to exhibit her work, only to discover that her brother who is gay and her lover are a couple! She makes friends again with Jaz who buys her old flat for her. In spite of their differing religious beliefs, they marry and have children. Some of the group enjoyed the book more than others. January's book was 'The Reading' by Sara Nisha Adams. Another family affair where an Indian man in London is feeling very lost since the death of his wife. Unbeknown to him, when he returns her library books, inside is a list of books he should read, all with a moral including Little Women and A Suitable Boy. He becomes fond of the young librarian who gives him each book in turn. He meets several people at the library and finds out about their respective lives — some tragic.

They all form a group and when the library is set for closure, they band together to save it. This allows him and his family to come to terms with their grief. An enjoyable and interesting read liked by all.

Our February book is by Jeffrey Archer - 'Only Time Will Tell'. Between March and June we will read 'The Wager 'by David Gann, 'The Precipice' by Robert Harris, 'The Island of Sea Women' by Lisa See and 'The Bookshop Ladies 'by Faith Hogan.

Donations are received from the general public, members of the congregations and local businesses. Thank you so much as this has meant that the shop has made in the region of £200,000 gross in sales since opening in 2015



We also liken it to a community hub with so many regular customers who pop in for a cuppy and a catch up - some of our regular visitors travel to Forfar only to visit the shop.

Thank you for your continuing support ****** Property Report - After many months of discussions, on 12th December East, Old and Inverarity took possession of a house in Turfbeg to become our new manse. There was nothing dramatic. Alistair Cluley the fabric convenor of Glamis Kirk simply met me at the "manse" to hand over the keys.

Here is a bit of background. The house was built by Mark Guild and was the show house for his Turfbeg scheme. Then a few years later Glamis,



Inverarity & Kinnettles were looking for a replacement for the old manse at Glamis which had been sold. The scenario was very similar to us now with the East Manse in that it was a difficult home to heat and maintain. The Turfbeg house became the

manse for the then Glamis, Inverarity & Kinnettles minister until he retired. It was then let out until August last year. When Glamis and Inverarity went their separate ways in October 2023, the building was the responsibility of Glamis, but Inverarity retained a half share of its value. Thus in December 2024, East, Old & Inverarity paid the new Strathmore Parish half of the valuation figure to "buy out" their share of ownership.

The property team have inspected the manse and were satisfied with its condition. However, as with any building, we have identified maintenance required for external painting and electrical upgrades. Now having a suitable approved manse allows Karen and the Nominating Committee to make progress with the vacancy. The property team are now satisfied that water ingress problems are resolved at East & Old, so internal remedial work will proceed shortly. An electrical safety upgrade was completed along with general maintenance.

At Inverarity the original hall kitchen units have been replaced and

equipment upgraded to reflect the increased use of the hall. In the Spring there will be repairs to church windows and long held off external painting work.

We are fortunate to have excellent well-maintained buildings to aid our search for a new minister.

Internet Feeds - I get daily/weekly emails on topics ranging from the News [well – the Courier], to Which and spirituality-based feeds.

One is a monthly newsletter from American Spiritual writer Joyce Rupp. Part of her February 2025 Newsletter struck a chord with me:

I'm grateful that I can embrace the sacredness of the natural world. When I am mindfully there, I feel a peace and equilibrium for my spirit found nowhere else.

In January I spent several weeks writing at a cabin in the woods. There I could sense all of life dwelling in the heart of the Holy. The ferocious winds, the bitterly cold below-zero nights, the dazzling stars I went out to admire before bedtime, the strength of moonlight casting long tree-shadows across the hills, the soft, gradual light of morning and the blazing red sunsets—all this led to inner harmony.

I felt a kinship with the frozen land and water, creatures and birds, including the nervous pheasants that went flying and screeching out of their roosts as I walked through the woods at sundown.

Within this sphere of contentment, I recognize how a struggle for harmony also takes place in the natural world, as with human life. Creation does let us forget how everything teems with its own life-death-rebirth cycles.

As I watched eagles dive to snatch squirrels and downy woodpeckers tap for insects in tree bark, I thought of the California wildfires consuming humans, homes, trees, vegetation, and creatures. Not everything Holy consists of consolation and joy. And yet, every part of what exists has been embraced by the Sacred.

B ooks that have made a difference - Have you ever had an ah-ha moment when reading a book? One book that had that effect on me was 'God of Surprises', written by a Scottish Jesuit Gerry Hughes.

The book invites us to move beyond conventional religious thinking and embrace a more personal, experiential, and liberating relationship with God. It speaks to those who feel spiritually restless, offering a fresh and hopeful perspective on faith. Hughes highlights:

God's Presence in Everyday Life – God is not confined to religious rituals or doctrines but can be encountered in ordinary experiences, personal struggles, and even doubts.

The Inner Journey – The book encourages introspection and self-awareness, helping readers uncover their true selves and recognize the divine at work in their lives.

Overcoming False Images of God – Many people struggle with distorted images of God—seeing God as distant, judgmental, or rigid. Hughes challenges these misconceptions and invites readers to embrace a God of love, mercy, and surprises.

Faith as a Journey, Not a Destination – Rather than presenting rigid doctrines, Hughes views faith as a dynamic process of questioning, growth, and continual discovery.
