

# LETTER FROM THE MANSE

#### My dear friends

When thinking about writing this letter for the Steeple Times I try to make it relevant as to what is happening in the church and/or community and even nationally or internationally. Just after this edition of the Steeple Times comes out Inverarity Church will have joined with East and Old Church with a new parish name of East, Old and Inverarity Parish however, we will still keep our own names as individual churches. Invergrity Church members will be asked if they wish to incorporate their membership into East and Old or stay with Glamis Church when the disjunction goes through. The elders will be incorporated into the Kirk Session and Inverarity Funds will be added to our funds. Now that all sounds relatively easy and nice and neat! However, there is always a but! Our treasurer will need to change the name of the bank accounts, weekly offering envelopes need altered for next year, sort out the gas, electric and now we have a septic tank to look after at Inverarity. As well as owning our current building and manse we will now own another church building, church hall and a house that Inverarity rent out. Some members of Inverarity Church live in Forfar so district cover will need to be amended and you may receive a new elder who worships at Inverarity Church and not Fast and Old.

Sadly, Inverarity Church building is under threat of closure from the Church of Scotland, and we have until December 2023 to put together a business plan with ideas that would make it worthwhile to keep the church building open. Inverarity Church Hall will remain open for worship no matter what. The Church building needs quite a bit of work to bring it up to what the Church of Scotland class as 'fit for purpose' in the 21<sup>st</sup> Century. To that end, Angus Spence from East and Old Church, David Pate, Diane Acheson and Fiona Gourlay from Inverarity Church are meeting and forming the business plan. However, here is another BUT! It is not all about the cost of bringing the building up to scratch — it is about the missional work and how we can utilise the buildings more effectively for us and the community. This is proving to be rather difficult at this stage. Do you have any ideas that we can look at as to how we could utilise the buildings for and would you be able to help out in any way if a new venture was to start.

And that brings us to East and Old and organisations and events

— WE NEED YOU!

As people are getting older, some have died and some people are reluctant to venture out — all our organisations and clubs are struggling for help. I can hear some people say they don't offer because that person normally does that, and that person helps there, but these people also need help and a bit of a rest! Many hands make light work! Matthew 9:37-38 — Then he said to his disciples, "The harvest is plentiful, but the workers are few. <sup>38</sup> Ask the Lord of the harvest, therefore, to send out workers into his harvest field." We are the workers in God's creation and the harvest is getting bigger and bigger in our world today. In East and Old we help people with mental illness, loneliness, hunger, heat poverty, activities for children and families, socialising, friendship, companionship and so much more but we could also be doing so much more. God's

mission never ends — it grows and keeps growing. If you have never been involved in some of the activities we do, then you will not have seen the pure joy and delight it brings to some people and to us the workers also. And there is a lot of JOY in East and Old and hopefully in Inverarity too.

Helping out does not always mean physical activities for there are many other ways in which you can help out. Please speak to me at any time! Every blessing to you all.

## WHAT'S BEEN HAPPENING

**Our minister** – we are sure you will know that the workload of our minister has increased significantly lately with two worship services every Sunday, the legal work and paperwork with Inverarity Church joining us and then the preparation of missional ideas to try and keep the Inverarity Church Building open. Barbara Ann is interim

Moderator of Monifieth Parish Church, which is going into a union with Monikie, Newbigging, Murroes and Tealing mid-September and if that is not busy enough, the hard work starts when they form a vacancy committee for the new

Monifieth South Angus Parish. During the month of September, Barbara Ann is also covering for pastoral care and funerals for 3 weeks at Monikie, Newbigging, Murroes and Tealing and for 2 weeks at Coupar Angus Church. Barbara Ann has said that sadly the first thing to go when a minister is this busy, is visiting and wants to offer an apology if you have been missed out of a visit recently. In the last few months we have been unable to get someone to take on the role of Property Convener so that has fallen to Barbara Ann also. If you think you can help out, or any family member or friend can help out in this area, please speak to them and Barbara Ann. The minister was working approximately 50-60 hours a week but that has now increased to 60-70 hours per week!

Doug Robertson and Jim Stewart have been eager beavers painting the hallway as you come in the brown session house doors, the fire alarm system has been maintained, boilers serviced, gutters cleared, the new unit in the social area is just about to be stained and a cupboard built upstail

area is just about to be stained and a cupboard built upstairs in the activity space. The next project for external workers is sheeting the entrance hallway at the east doors where you come in on a Sunday morning. Nothing in the church is small or comes cheap so just think of many, many thousands of pounds! Try in excess of £15,000! In the church we have been using contract cleaners for a year now

however the work was not being done properly and the decision was made to terminate the contract. Just about the same time Barbara Ann met Nataliia who is a Ukrainian visitor staying with one of our members and she was looking for a job. Nataliia has started working for us as a cleaner on a temporary contract until the Kirk Session make a decision about what is to happen in the future.



inance – everyone will have noticed the cost of energy, the cost of shopping and holidays going up and up and up and the church is no different!

We are so very grateful for all the donations that our members and friends of the church give on a weekly, monthly and yearly basis but, if possible, we are asking

you to look at what you give. When was the last time you increased your offering? Have you been giving the same amount for years? Some people in the church put in less a week then they spend on a cup of coffee outside! Others give very generously indeed! If what you donate at this present time is everything you can afford, then thank you very much. However, if you know you could "up your offering", we would be very grateful indeed. Sadly, more and more of our members are no longer with us and being honest with you, some of those members have been our big givers in the past. This means that our annual amount that comes in through offerings in a variety of ways no longer covers our bills and we are relying on our reserve money and fundraising. Please give this matter prayerful consideration.

**G** eneral Assembly – our minister was asked to host Dianna Wright from the Presbyterian Church of the United States of America who is an ecumenical leader within her church. Dianna was treated to some great Scottish food, an entertainment evening at the manse with members of Accord and preached in our church on the Sunday. We are so blessed that our minister and her husband open up their home to visiting guests as we gain so much from it as a church and a community.

Strathmore Primary School – many of you will be aware that the P7's of the school, worked alongside members of the church to supply a lunch every Wednesday lunchtime – Heavenly Bites! The children had a great time preparing, cooking, and serving the food as well as sampling it. They then cleared the tables and did the dishes in the dishwasher – that was popular! This was part of their enterprise module at school and they received £230 profit from the donations.

At the end of every term East and Old award a shield and a small donation to every primary year for the best child at RME – Religious and Moral Education. Our minister attended the prize giving ceremony and was asked to hand out the RME awards and prizes.

#### Treasurer's Report

I had hoped to have an extract of the 2022 Final Accounts for this edition of the Steeple Times, but unfortunately a number of mitigating factors has delayed their completion which is not the norm for us here at East and Old as we are usually prompt with our accounts.

Something the Finance Team have been discussing at our recent meetings is the impact on the Church finances with the rising costs of everything and the recovery after the impact of the Covid-19 pandemic, so I decided to look at our accounts from 2017 and compare them with 2022 to look for any noticeable differences.


Good news came first when I was looking at the 'The Big Kirk Shop's' sales from 2017 compared to 2022. Both years were very similar with the same increases in sales at the same periods of the year. The team in the shop continue to work hard and we are so thankful for all the generous donations that we receive.

Next, I looked at the comparison in Utility costs but luckily we have been on fixed-rate tariffs so the only slight increase was to our gas bill during the winter months which was expected due to the Heat Hubs running. Our Electricity contract ends next month, and the Gas contract ends in April 2024, so I predict a massive increase in both utility bills.

The biggest shock was when looking at the difference in Freewill Offerings received in Church during our Sunday Worship. As you can see from my chart, most months our offerings in 2022 are half of what they were in 2017. During Covid-19 and with the closure of the Church at that time, more members arranged to pay directly by Standing Order but unfortunately this has not made up for the shortfall we have seen in the Freewill Offerings plate during Worship Services.



We are still making a good income from our room lets within the Church and since our boost online and our leaflets advertising all our available spaces and the services we provide in 2022 we have attracted so many more organisations to use our building.



On **Monday 18<sup>th</sup>** - **Day trip to Dundee to see some of the sights** and enjoy some free time. Please come and join us and show our guests around.


