LETTER FROM THE MANSE

My dear friends

I simply cannot believe it is nearing the end of 2019! It only feels like a few months ago we were bringing in the Bells at the Cross and at the party in the Church! What a year we have had in 2019 – busy, busy, busy and being your minister I wouldn't have it any other way. At the end of the year I normally sit back, take stock and reflect on what we have done as a church for our members, for the community and for the world and once again it is a huge amount and you the members and friends of East and Old deserve a little clap on your back – so go on – do that now! Put your hand on your back and give it a tap! Congratulations! When I say busy it does not necessarily mean working at 100 mph it also means every activity we are involved in with the church from sitting quietly in the prayer group, to meditating, to walking with the walking group or taking part in the *Relay for Life and everything in between. There are three big success* stories that I want to remind you of in this last year. The 'Friends R' Us' group which is for widows, widowers and single people has been a great hit with numbers up to about 25 people. And lastly our family trips and away days where we are now connecting with many people outside the church community and it has already paid dividends with some of these people helping out at church events and also attending some of our fund raising events. As I am sitting writing this part of the letter more and more of what we do in East and Old keeps jumping into my mind

but are we being busy in the right way; are we reaching more and more of unchurched people and people who have not yet come to know Jesus in their lives! I believe we are to a certain point. We try to offer many avenues to our members and friends to get to know and to get closer to God through our words, deeds and actions but on closer inspection and reflection we are missing out in one area. I really thought that we had something to offer everyone who came looking at our church to get to know God but a mum who attended our day trips emailed me and said she was impressed with what we were doing and wanted to know what the church ran that she or her daughter, separately or together could consider coming along too. The lady was in her early thirties and her daughter 11 years of age. My answer was church, Groovy Gryphons and the cooking and baking classes – I couldn't think of anything else because the mum worked during the day! We know this age group of adults and children are missing in our church and in many churches in Scotland and over the years the activities for this age group have also stopped. So this will be our focus as we look ahead into 2020 both for myself and the Kirk Session but we need your help too. Talk about the good work in East and Old, offer to help in our numerous avenues for missional work and be on the lookout for new ideas to attract new people and younger people. If you come across anything please speak to me.

I wish you all a very happy Christmas and a peaceful 2020!


WHAT'S BEEN HAPPENING

The children from Strathmore Primary School really enjoy coming along to the church on the third Thursday of every month. Sadly though the numbers attending the café are going down and on most occasions there are more pupils than guests at

the café. Can we please ask you to consider coming along on the third Thursday of every month during school term but not in December as the school programme is very, very busy. You will be made to feel very welcome and enjoy a two course lunch – all just for a donation.

C ommunion Services Sunday 20th at 2:30pm – thank you to everyone who came along to these ever increasing and popular service. It is a more traditional service with the lovely tempting afternoon tea afterwards. Thank you to the team who made the food and baking and helped to serve.

Sunday 27th at 11:00am – it was lovely to see a busy church at this

service and a big thank you for the donations to the fabric fund. This fund is separate from the DIF Fund and pays for the normal repairs and workings in the church through the year.



Sunday 27^{th} at 6:30pm – a more reflective type of service in the evening and a chance to see those who sometimes struggle to get to church in the morning. Even with a number of only 50 people the singing was great.

Our minister would like to say thank you to everyone involved in the communion services as there is a lot of preparation and stress on the day for them and it doesn't help when she changes how things are done that morning – you would think they would be used to it by now!

First Sunday of the month Communions - Sometimes these services have 50 to 60 people at them which is very good. These services are shorter, quieter and more reflective and always finish with celebrating the sacrament of communion which the attendees appreciate.

ig Sing for Remembrance What a fantastic evening and if you were not there then you really missed a special occasion This was another wonderful idea from our minister and nearly all the churches in Forfar took part along with a number of organisations and individuals. There were war songs, hymns, letters written by servicemen, stories and at the end of the evening our Boys Brigade performed the Drumhead Service which was very good and the boys and officers looked so smart, well behaved and respectful. Thanks to Bob Kidd for organising the Drumhead Service and for getting all the names of the war dead into the book of remembrance from all the churches. A big thank you to Maggie Findlay for her rendition of 'Bring him home' which moved many people to tears. The retiring offering of a magnificent sum of £800 is being sent to the Normandy Memorial Fund where a wall is being built with engraved names of all who died at Normandy, including those from the local area. One of the families in our church – the Donaldson family will have their uncle's name of Andrew Robb on the wall when it is complete.



emembrance Sunday Our service started at 10:45am and there were a good number of people present all wearing their red poppies. Thanks goes to our minister for the tribute to our fallen and current servicemen and to James Robertson for playing the bagpipes leading up to and after the two minute silence. The wreaths this year were laid by Jim Nicol and Ron Johnstone at the WWI and WWII windows and Irene Duthie laid the wreath on behalf of the Boys' Brigade. Most people then headed down to The Cross for the 12:30pm service which was led by all the clergy in Forfar and members of the British Legion.

Quite a number of people from the church met the Syrian family Thaer (dad), Manar (mum), Shahd (9), Sham (6) and Fajar (8 months), when they came to stay at the Manse with Barbara Ann and Billy in mid-October. Their holiday was part of a pilot scheme being run in conjunction with the Church of Scotland and some councils and in this case Aberdeenshire Council. The family are Muslim and the only restrictions throughout the stay was Halal food was to be eaten, no pork and avoid doing things at prayer time (approximately 5 times a day). This all worked in very well throughout the holiday. Paula Stewart our treasurer and her children Jack and Arwen helped during the visit in so many ways by supplying children's toys and car seats and also playing with the children. Bob Kidd joined us on a trip and others including our Echo Teens attended the manse on Saturday night to get to know the family and try some Syrian home-made food! Yummy! Thaer and

Manar were so very grateful for everything that Barbara Ann and Billy did for them and organised along with Paula. A walk around Forfar and the Loch, Brechin Castle Outdoor Park, dinner at Chapter & Verse and Glasgow Science Centre with the church bus trip. The family



then attended worship at the Glasgow Mosque and later met Barbara Ann and Billy at a restaurant where they had a lovely Syrian Meal with wonderful food and by this time the family knew that Barbara Ann could not eat anything spicy! On the Saturday it was off to Perth swimming pool which was a big, big hit and Thaer and Billy baby sat Fajar while everyone including Paula and her children went swimming and down the chutes. On their return to Forfar it was off to Tiffins (most meat is Halal) for more fabulous food and to Broughty Ferry for ice-cream even though it was cold outside! The children's eyes were as wide as saucers when they saw the choices of ice-cream that were on offer. The problem arose when Barbara Ann was trying to explain what tablet, bubble gum and numerous other flavoured ice-creams tasted like with the queue getting bigger and bigger behind them! After arriving back at the manse later than expected the guests showed up and ended up setting the table while Thaer and Manar cooked a wonderful two-course meal. Thanks to Sue Proctor for the dessert! During the evening the manse lounge became a no-go area for the adults – they were barred while all the children happily played together. On Sunday morning the whole family attended worship in our church and without any warning our minister asked them to speak. Thaer explained that they left Syria very early – just after the fighting started. They moved to Lebanon and Thaer got a job as a waiter. However before they left Syria Thaer was an Arabic Literature teacher and Manar an Art Teacher but for various reasons they couldn't teach in Lebanon. After 4 years with over 5 million Syrian refugees in Lebanon, their economy was being affected and the locals started turning against the Syrians making it necessary for them to get out of Lebanon so the family went to the UN offices and were eventually offered the UK but they did not know where until arriving in Inverurie where they have been living for 18 months and have settled in well. The two older children are fluent in Arabic and English and it is so funny to watch the children correct what their parents are saying. Thaer is at college because he cannot get a job in Britain until he has an

intermediate English Certificate but he is fluent in speaking English and



Manar recently sat a basic English test and passed with flying colours. Before sitting down after they had spoken to the church members and friends, they said that they felt that Barbara Ann and Billy were now part of their family and they had had a wonderful time and so many new experiences in the 5 short days.

At the end of October when Billy, Barbara Ann and her sister Sandra were driving back from Elgin they had arranged to pop into Inverurie to see the family and were warmly welcomed and fed until they could eat no more – as soon as the food was served Manar said – NO SPICE! It was a lovely time they spent together.


oliday Club Fund

The Kirk Session decided they would also like to help some children during the holiday period in October to attend classes that were running with other organisations. They decided to spend £120 for 6 children to attend fun activities. However this proved to be very difficult to put into action even with the help of the school. Two children received £20 each to attend a week long course but we were left with £80. One of our members actually donated the money for this to our minister rather than using church funds and agreed that the other £80 could be spent on the Syrian family that were staying with the minister.

During the school holidays in October we went on a trip up to Pitlochry to The Enchanted Forest. There is a different theme every year and to commemorate the 50th anniversary of the moon landing the theme for 2019 was space related, the kids and leaders had a great time. Matthew took a few photos and produced a slide show which was shown to the congregation a few weeks later during the Sunday service.

Sale of our Church Hall

Our church hall in Chapel Street is now up for sale at Wardhaughs. Information as to why we are selling the building is on our website but we have also printed it here for you.

In July 2016 we embarked on our <u>Million Pound</u> <u>Challenge</u> to implement our Vision for East & Old Parish Church into the 21st Century.



This transformed our ground level of the church building into a flexible multi-purpose space available to all. The first phase also prepared our upper floor for additional rooms and connection with our existing Session House.

The cost of Phase One works was some £775,000 with the bulk of the funds provided by our congregation both past and present, with top up grants from various sources and local donations.

<u>Phase Two works</u> were priced following completion of Phase One around March 2017. The costs involved were once again significant and with insufficient funds available to commit to a single contractor, the Kirk Session decided to move forward in stages as funding became available. Our congregation, members and local supporters continue to be amazing and we have raised sufficient funds to proceed to the installation of the lift to the first floor - this is currently in progress.

To complete our works and utilise the new upper levels we have identified surplus assets that will raise funds for Phase Two works and for our wider community work into the future. Our Chapel Street Hall is one of those assets that is now surplus to our requirements as we are creating a single building with multi-functional rooms that will



meet all our needs into the future. The financial overheads of supporting multiple buildings is significant and not viable in the long term.
