

LETTER FROM THE MANSE

My dear friends

We are now into the month of March and as you receive this edition I will be on holiday — YES AGAIN! Billy and I had a lovely week with the family in Gran Canarias in early January with a temperature of 23 degrees during the day and 17-18 degrees at night. However, before I went on holiday, I had a mild case of the flu, so the holiday was a welcome relief and aided my recovery. The one thing that has come to my notice this year is that so many people are catching colds, flus, coughs and Covid, and those catching the Covid seem to have avoided it for the last three years — I know of at least 5 people in this situation. Sadly, there has also been a number of deaths over this time and one of my friends has just been diagnosed with a rare auto-immune disease and will be in hospital for months.

On the first Sunday in February I preached about Jesus, his healing powers and that Jesus passed these healing powers onto his disciples and ultimately to you and I. We all know the NHS is going through a rough period at this time but where would we be without them — the NHS workers are angels in disguise. Yes, there will be some of you who have been let down by the NHS now or in the past but I for one really appreciate them and thank them and of course the tax-payers who pay for it. The NHS cannot do everything, and they also rely on organisations and individuals in the community to help out — that is where we come in — we are Jesus' healing hands in our community and further afield.

In the church we offer companionship, fellowship, warm spaces, two different ways to help people with Dementia and their carers, we support the staff and children at Strathmore Primary School, we support families in the community with

pre-school clubs, BB, food parcels and food vouchers. Our shop supports many people in the community and not just because our prices are good but because of the friendly staff who have formed a community in the shop. I know many of you visit and phone members in the church to see how they are doing or if they need shopping and even a wee run in the car somewhere for a coffee.

Another form of healing hands comes from our prayer group. Did you know our prayer group prays for you, your families, this town, and a whole variety of situations both locally and across the world. They meet every week to discuss what is happening in the church and ask for God's support in our missional work, for God's intervention in war torn areas and as I write this letter especially in Turkey and Syria. Can you pray to God and thank God for what we have in our life, for our climate, our houses and food and yes holidays! When was the last time we said sorry in our prayers for hurting others or doing wrong? When was the last time you prayed out-with a church service? Praying for others helps them.

At the time of writing this letter we had just launched the Disasters Emergency Committee Appeal for Turkey and Syria and we will let you know how much we raised through retiring offerings and donations in the next issue.

Jesus instructed us to care for others and the children at Strathmore Primary are always being taught

– Sharing is Caring! Many of you do share and share a lot!

However, you know my mantra – we can always do more!

Can you share your time, talents and money to help others?

They have also changed the format so that people do not feel threatened about praying aloud and discuss what it is that we, our community and world need to prayer about.

B ible Study – why not come along to our monthly Bible Study group in the church office once a month on a Tuesday evening from



6:30pm to 7:30pm. We look at a bible passage and think through anything that we agree with or disagree with and how that relates to us today. It is an informal meeting with lots of different views shared and it is amazing what we learn about the bible, ourselves, others and different situations.

he Wellbean Café now run their café in the church every Tuesday between 12 noon and 2:00pm and is open to everyone in the community. What a fantastic lunch you get. On offer every week is home-made soup,



toasties with a variety of fillings, home-made cheese scones and as much tea, coffee and juice as you can drink. However, there is also a dish of the day which is sometimes themed to fit in with the time of year. There's been Haggis, Beef Hot Pot, Stovies, Curry, Baked Potatoes and so much more. osy Corner Café is our own lunch club → and is held every Wednesday from 12 noon where you have a choice of homemade soup and a selection of sandwiches. Everyone is welcome and once again all that is asked is a donation.

trathmore Primary School – we all know what a great relationship our minister has with the staff and pupils of Strathmore Primary and now Sheila our family worker is involved there too. The school were delighted to receive all the food at Christmas and many of the Strathmore families received vouchers



for £20 at the end of January to help with their food bills and this was in conjunction with Angus Council Food Provision and ourselves. Barbara Ann was also invited to help judge the Scottish Poetry Competition for P2 to P7 and she said that the standard was excellent, the diction super, the acting and the enthusiasm were a joy to see and hear.

orfar Disabled Club — the disabled club had to vacate their meeting premises for a couple of weeks and East and Old were delighted to be able to help out along with our BB company. The first week they used our social area but the second week the whole church was busy — with most of the rooms in use so the BB leaders reorganised their evening to help accommodate the Disabled Club. A few of our members turned up to help set up the chairs and tables upstairs and took up the cups and tea and coffee thank you to the helpers. Thank you also to the Disabled Club for their donation for the use of the premises — we were glad to be able to help them out.

ngoing Training – a number of people in the church are trained in using the defibrillator situated in the building, and a number are trained in First Aid, food hygiene and hygiene in the kitchen and now our minister is trained in administering naloxone to people who have overdosed on drugs. As a Kirk Session we have been instructed for all elders to be trained in safeguarding. At present only 4 elders plus our minister have this training so over the next little while all our elders will need this training to be completed. The general Assembly of the Church of Scotland has also instructed that all ministers need advance training and then leadership training in this area.


